Superintendent Search

With the recent announcement of Superintendent Mary Faley's retirement, the Board has been tasked with hiring a new District Superintendent. Selecting a new Superintendent is probably the most important decision the Board will ever make.

Our search commenced in late September when the Board met with our search consultant. An online community survey was conducted from October 9th thru October 31st. The survey results were reviewed by the Board.

Attributes for the job posting as well as specific questions for the applicants were discussed and agreed upon by the Board.
The search opened on October 4th and closed on November 1st. The Board screened 8 applicants and on November 14th and 16th interviewed, via Zoom, the 4 qualifying candidates in Executive Session. After discussion of our candidates, the

Board reconvened into regular open session and named Daniel Erickson as our sole finalist.

The final interview with Mr. Erickson will take place on December 5th in Executive Session. Following this in-person interview, there will be a Community Forum for the finalist to answer questions put forth by the public. After the Community Forum, the Governing Board will reconvene into Executive Session to review input from the Community. It is our hope to be able to name our new District Superintendent that evening after the final Executive Session.

We would encourage all parents, teachers, staff, and community members to engage in this important process by attending the Community Forum on December 5th at 5:00 PM in the Conference Room.

1st Grade

First grade had a very busy fall in 2023! The highlights of our fall include States of Matter experiments, a field trip to Apple Annie's, and Halloween and Thanksgiving STEAM days.

We studied the different states of matter in which, at the end of the experiments, the students were able to see the actual possible

states of matter can make. One experiment involved using vinegar and baking soda to cause a chemical reaction to blow up a balloon. First graders really enjoyed seeing what could happen with different states of matter.

The 1st grade and kindergarten classes went on a field trip to Apple Annie's in Willcox, in October. We all went through the corn maze several times and every student was able to pick out and take home a pumpkin. The 1st grade class also got to take a pumpkin back to the classroom to dissect and learn about its life cycle.

Halloween and Thanksgiving STEAM days were filled with fun science, technology, engineering, art, and math learning projects. Activities included labeling the parts of a pumpkin, building straw bridges, testing the density of objects, and making flying bats. Additionally, each student made a pie in a cup by following a recipe on their own. They also made pilgrim hats while learning about the first Thanksgiving.

We had so much fun! We can't wait to see what next quarter holds.











Middle School Scient

Middle school science students are challenged to communicate their understanding of natural phenomena and the workings of human-designed inventions. We first look at what we think is happening and then we examine our ideas to see if we are on the right track. Uncovering our possible misconceptions is a constant backdrop for growing our new understanding.

The first topic that 6th graders tackled is the particle nature of matter including how molecules move during changes in states of matter and how heat transfers. We learned how to draw models by showing how ice cubes affect the temperature of lemonade (hint: heat always transfers from the warmer substance), and we tested how insulation works in model houses.





Seventh grade students started the year learning about Newton's laws of motion and noncontact forces. We attempted a new activity (spinning a water balloon) to investigate terminal velocity - it was fun and wet! And, we made our own speakers while learning about electromagnetism. We also had fun making slime during our annual Halloween science lab.





Nurse's Tips for December

This month brings lots of exciting times. Changes in the weather, the Missoula Children's Theatre, preparations for the holidays, and time with family. Some tips for December are:

- 1. Dress your child in layers to accommodate for the changing temperatures and days this month. Mark clothing with names on the tags. Escort your child into the gym to search the "Lost and Found" bin and retrieve their items. Many times, children can't remember or identify them.
- 2. Encourage oral fluids to keep hydrated. The colder weather can be deceiving, as many of us forget to drink. Water bottles should go home at a minimum **every Friday** to get sanitized at home with hot soapy water or vinegar for a good scrubbing. Bacteria and other contaminates can grow quickly. Wouldn't you want a clean beverage container to drink from on a daily basis?
- 3. Wash hands frequently. Encourage rinsing all the way up and past the forearms. Many smaller children forget to rinse off the soap, and come in with contact dermatitis or rashes that are red and painful. Lotion for dry skin in the morning can also help keep the skin in good condition. Your skin is the biggest barrier in preventing germs from getting into your body.
- 4. Days are long in preparing for the Missoula Children's Theatre. Pack extra drinks and protein packed snacks for eating after school and between practices. Stomachs are small, and growth spurts result in needed additional calories. Hunger pains are real, and it is hard to concentrate when your belly hurts.
- 5. Consider getting your flu shots. Also, use the winter break as a time to catch up on needed immunizations and doctor's appointments.
- 6. Stay home if feeling poorly. Viruses are contagious 24-hours before a fever shows up. Don't show up to school and "try and make it through the day." Stay home one day to rest and hydrate. Many times, this is all that is needed to overcome an illness.
- 7. Shop as a family for safe toys. December is "Safe Toy Month" (see tips below).




