

This is a time when students can reflect on all they've accomplished and give their best effort to end the year on a high note. Please help us encourage your child to:


- Attend school every day unless they are ill

Public Safety Day

On April 25th our campus was filled with excitement during *Public Safety Day*! Students had an incredible opportunity to meet and learn from real-life heroes who work every day to keep our community safe. The event included agents from the U.S. Border Patrol and Customs, with a K9 unit and a long-range thermal imaging camera, alongside the Department of Public Safety's Highway Patrol and Motors Unit. The Sonoita-Elgin Fire District engaged students with their fire trucks, ambulances, ATV, and wildfire response vehicles. Santa Cruz County Sheriff's Department introduced us to their deputies and DARE program, while the Arizona Rangers brought both their rangers *and* their horse! The event also included a special visit from AirMedCare's medical helicopter.

It was an amazing experience for students and the community to engage with our local first responders and explore the resources and technology they use to protect and serve. A huge thank you to all the departments who made this unforgettable day possible!

Nurse's Corner

Summer break is almost upon us!

Here are some things to help prepare for the last day of school:

- Medications
 - Pick up your child's medications from the nurse's office the last two days of school.
 You can make an appointment, or just drop by.
 - o Abandoned items will be properly disposed of.
- Forms for next year
 - Emergency Action Plans, such as Allergic Reaction/EpiPens and Asthma/Inhalers.
 These need to be completed and signed by your child's doctor every school year.
 They are actually your child's doctor orders.
 - o Refill new prescriptions the month before school starts, if you can. This helps assure your child's medications stay current throughout the upcoming school year.
- Clothing
 - Retrieve personal use items from the nurse's office. Anything left behind will be donated to the lending closet.
 - o Return any loaned clothing they borrowed from the lending closet
 - O Donate clothing in good condition to the lending closet. Things needed are:
 - Size 4-10 leggings and jeans with expandable waistbands
 - Teen size jeans and sweats


If you have any suggestions or feedback regarding your child's healthcare this year, please share them with me. I am always open to making improvements.

Complimentary Hot Dogs & Hamburgers will be served! We will have game booths and a bouncy house as well!



Connecting you to your child's school lunchroom



SKIM MILK

Our school meal program strives to provide the best nutrition for our students. Let's dive into the world of dairy and understand the requirements set for fluid milk in school breakfast and lunch.

WHY MILK MATTERS

Milk is more than just a beverage; it's a powerhouse of essential nutrients crucial for growing bodies. From calcium and vitamin D to protein and potassium, milk offers a myriad of health benefits, supporting bone health, muscle function, and overall growth.

MEETING USDA STANDARDS

Our school breakfast and lunch programs adhere to the latest USDA guidelines when it comes to fluid milk. Current rules state that schools are required to offer only fat-free (unflavored or flavored) and low-fat (unflavored or flavored) milk options. This ensures that our students receive the nutritional benefits of milk without unnecessary added fats.

ENCOURAGING MILK CONSUMPTION

Parents, we encourage you to reinforce the importance of milk consumption with your children, both at school and at home. Whether it's enjoying a glass of milk with dinner or incorporating milk into snacks, every sip contributes to their overall health and well-being.

What About Milk Substitutes?

A common request we receive from parents revolves around milk substitutes such as lactose-free or nondairy milks (soy, rice, coconut, almond). For students with a disability such as a food allergy, we require a written medical statement from a licensed physician, physician assistant, or advanced practice nurse to make a substitution.

Requests based on taste preferences, religious, moral, or health concerns do not qualify as a disability. In these cases, we may offer lactose-free milk or non-dairy milk at our discretion that meets the USDA nutrition standards for milk substitutions.
