Middle School Social Studies By Mrs. Cranston

What a great quarter it's been! Our students have been learning so much, working together with curiosity and enthusiasm. Here's what they've been exploring:

Sixth Grade: Discovering the Ancient World

Our sixth graders have settled beautifully into middle school life, welcoming three new classmates—Ben, Henry, and Destyni—to our community. They mastered how the world is mapped, showing their knowledge with creative tourist brochures.

Kids had fun bringing the Neolithic Agricultural Revolution to life through comic stories featuring Paleolithic Pete and Neolithic Ned. This creative project helped them understand how agriculture changed human life!

The highlight was an incredible field trip to the Old Pueblo Archaeological Center, where they worked as archaeologists conducting simulated digs in Hohokam pit houses, crafting traditional coiled pots, and examining authentic artifacts.

Seventh Grade: Renaissance to Exploration

Seventh graders are growing as thinkers while exploring world history. They wrote about Renaissance thinkers and artists who transformed their world.

The quarter's standout moment was their mock trial of Martin Luther versus Henry VII, where students demonstrated deep understanding of the Protestant Reformation.

Now they're investigating European explorers and their impact on Europe and the Western Hemisphere.

Eighth Grade: The Foundations of American Democracy

Our eighth graders have been studying the Constitution and government structures. They analyzed the Preamble, then explored the legislative branch by learning how Senators and Representatives serve our democracy.

Students had the opportunity to "grade" Senator Gallego or Senator Kelly. Some students even met representative candidate Butierez at the fair and talked about the U.S. Legislative branch!

Currently, they're examining presidential powers, building civic knowledge they'll need as future citizens.

A Community of Learners

Our students have consistently shown curiosity and engagement. We've received wonderful compliments from substitute teachers and field trip volunteers about how respectfully and kindly our students conduct themselves.

As we look ahead to the rest of the year, we're excited to see how our students will continue to grow and explore the rich connections between past and present.





Building Kindergarten-Ready Kids, One Story at a Time

Wednesday mornings are Preschool Story Time at Elgin School. Here are a few of the Kindergarten Readiness Skills we practice during story time:

- **Listening and Focus** Sitting for a story helps kids learn to pay attention and follow along.
- **Vocabulary and Language** New words and sentence patterns help grow communication skills.
- **Print Awareness** Kids begin to understand how books work (left to right, top to bottom).
- **Social Skills** Taking turns and sharing help with classroom behavior.
- **Comprehension** Talking about story elements and making predictions builds critical thinking.
- **Fine Motor Skills** Cutting, tracing, and other activities improve hand strength and eye-hand coordination.
- **Building Curiosity** Hands-on learning sparks imagination and learning.

Students who will be entering Kindergarten for the 2026-2027 school year are welcome to join us Wednesday mornings in the gym for flag at 7:55, followed by story time in the preschool room. Come to see our campus, meet new friends, and have some fun!












Is your child struggling to get their backpack onto their back, in and out of the car, or leaning forward while carrying it? If so, their backpack may be too heavy to carry.

The National Safety Council suggests:

- Your child's backpack weigh 10% or less of their body weight
 - o A 40 lb. student in kindergarten should carry 4 lbs or less
 - Equal to a ½ gallon of water
 - Less than a small bag of sugar
 - An 120 lb. middle schooler should carry less than 12lbs
 - Equal to 1 ½ gallons of water
 - Slightly more than a large bag of sugar
- Heavy backpacks can cause
 - o Back pain
 - Shoulder pain
 - Poor posture
- A backpack being
 - no wider or no longer than the torso
 - Shouldn't hang more than 4" from the waist
- Cleaning out the backpack every week
- If it is not essential, leave it home or in the classroom





ARIZONA HARVEST FACTS!

- Summer squash is native to the Americas and was a staple in Native American diets.
- The most common summer squashes are crookneck, zucchini, scallop, or patty pan.
- Squash belongs in the Cucurbitaceae family, which also includes cucumbers and melons.
- Summer squash is considered easy to grow and requires minimal maintenance to harvest.
- Summer squash grows quickly and is harvested during the summer months. It can be ready to pick just 50 to 65 days after planting
- For all varieties of summer squash, choose squash that are glossy, small-to-medium-sized, and heavy for their size.
 Choose squash that is firm and free of blemishes and damage.
- It is best not to peel the squash before cooking since vitamins and minerals are found mainly in the skin.
- Summer squash is high in vitamin C, vitamin A, potassium, and magnesium.

LOCAL RECIPE: Calabacitas Casserole Recipe

Serving size: 1 cup, Yield 6 servings NSLP Vegetable Crediting Information: ½ cup Other, ¼ cup Starch, ⅙ cup Red/Orange,

- · 4 cups zucchini, sliced
- 2 cups corn kernels
- 1 cup shredded cheese
- 1 cup diced tomatoes
- 1 cup onion, chopped
- 2 tbsp olive oil
- 1 tsp salt
- 0.5 tsp black pepper

This Calabacitas Casserole is a hearty mix of zucchini, corn, tomatoes, and cheese. It's easy to make, bursting with flavor, and makes the perfect side dish for many entrees.

To ensure food safety with summer squash always thoroughly wash them under running water before cutting, eating and/or cooking.




