Middle School Language Arts

"Writing is an escape from a world that crowds
me. I like being alone in a room; it's almost a
meditation, an investigation of my own life."

The above quote is from Neil Simon, an American playwright known for his brilliant, witty work such as "The Odd Couple," and "Lost in Yonkers," the latter of which earned him a Pulitzer Prize in 1991. Introducing the middle school ELA students to individuals like Neil Simon is part of the theme for this semester: 'Self Discovery.' The objective is to acquaint them with a diverse range of influential writers and speakers, all while fostering an understanding and appreciation of the English language. They are given a new vocabulary word daily, and each Monday they're introduced to a quote from a significant individual from the world of literature, poetry, or theater. Additionally, my hope is that with their structured class including a minimum of 10 minutes of reading each day, the students might learn to appreciate the power of reading a book. In a world filled with technology, I endeavor to carve out a window each day where they are able to escape from the mundane and enter the sublime world created by immersion into a captivating story.

Another task the students have is to write twice weekly in their journals. This is a less structured exercise, allowing them the opportunity to describe how they feel and how they experience the world around them. Pictured below is an image of one student's journal; they are encouraged to personalize it with drawings, quotes, and words that are meaningful to them. One of the recent assignments they completed was to imagine what it would be like to travel to a country where English is not spoken. They also have listened to various inspirational speeches and were tasked with writing about them. Below are some excerpts from their work:

"I traveled to Tokyo, but I can't understand the language or (read) any of the signs. However, I can use gestures to explain what I want. To make friends, I would use what I learned at home to get around. If I took a trip like this (to several countries), I would see many iconic landmarks, hear many different languages, and meet interesting people."



8th Grade Marine Biology Club - By Ms. Kyndra Ortiz

Nestled about 26 miles off the coast of Southern California, Catalina Island feels almost like another world. Each May, Elgin School's 8th Grade Marine Biology Club has the opportunity to attend a week-long educational camp on this beautiful island. Catalina Island Marine Institute (CIMI) provides students the chance to engage in confidence and team building activities, such as snorkeling, kayaking, rock-climbing, and tide-pooling, all while learning about the ocean and unique ecosystems of the island.



Catalina Island and the waters around it are home to numerous species of wildlife such as bison, fox, woodpeckers, blue whales, dolphins, sea lions, sunfish, and maybe the most notably, the Garibaldi, California's state marine fish, which is bright orange in color. While on the island, students are housed in ocean front cabins and provided delicious balanced meals by the camp's kitchen staff. All educational labs and

activities are overseen by Camp Counselors and the 8th Grade sponsors-Coach Harper and Ms. Ortiz.

Camp Counselors are typically collegiate level Marine Biology students seeking further education and research opportunities while employed at CIMI. Kailey was the Eagle's counselor in 2021-22 and shared her passion and knowledge of algae and kelp with Elgin students. Giant Kelp forests are found just off the coast of Catalina Island. Students snorkeled through, took samples, and even got to taste the kelp. Jules hosted the 2022-23 Elgin Eagles and shared her expertise of marine mammals. Jules has worked with dolphins, orcas, and other marine mammals in Aquarium (captivity) environments. During a kayaking trip students were able to observe a baby sea lion sunbathing on a rock while another adult sea lion swam nearby.

The 2023-24 8th Grade Marine Biology club will be hosting multiple fundraising opportunities including the Annual Walk-A-Thon, Krispy Kreme doughnut sales, and sports concessions to fund their CIMI trip May 13-17th, 2024. It is the generous support of the community that has allowed the CIMI trip to occur for the past 15 years, with the exception of 2 years that the camp was closed due to COVID restrictions. Donations up to \$400 are eligible for Tax Credit.

The Art classroom has been bustling with activity! We spent the first few classes learning the basics and navigating the classroom procedures. Then, the creativity began!

We have been creating with watercolor paints and chalk, free form drawing, and guided drawing. We have been learning about primary, secondary, and analogous colors as well as warm and cool colors and how to put them all together in our compositions. We are collecting pieces to enter into the Santa Cruz County Fair later in the month.

The middle school classes have been making resin projects and learning how to manipulate their art pieces with planning and placement. It has been fun to see the final results. The students have been working with alcohol ink, miniature items, mica powder, and glitter in their creations with some fabulous results.

The art room also has a classroom pet. "Sizzles", a water turtle that belongs to Mrs. Coleman's daughter, has taken up residence. He loves swimming for the students and follows their fingers along the glass. He is set up in the Calming Corner, where students are able to sit and read quietly or just watch him in his tank when they are finished with their projects.

The school year is off to a wonderful start in the art room!

Kinder Readiness - By Dr. Chris Clouse

Elgin Elementary School and The Family Resource Center from the University of Arizona Cooperative Extension provide weekly Kinder Readiness classes. Families with children ages 4 and 5 are welcome to join us on Wednesdays. Children meet in the gym for flag at 7:55 and then go to the library at 8:15 for story time and activities.

During class, children are introduced to different books. They practice literacy skills like sequencing, predicting, and finding similarities and differences. They work on fine motor skills with writing, coloring, cutting, crafts, and educational toys. Books are provided for students to take home and read.

10 TIPS ON GOOD BACKPACK ERGONOMICS



1. Choose a backpack with wide padded shoulder straps.



2. Wear both shoulder straps 3. Never overpack! Backpack to prevent shoulder alignment issues.



should never weigh more than 15% of your body weight.



Always lift your backpack by squatting down and using your legs to lift, not your back.



5. Look for backpacks with a waist and chest belt to better distribute heavy loads.



6. Position the backpack below your shoulders and above your hips.



7. A backpack with multiple compartments can better distribute the load.



8. Encourage your child to remove their backpack when waiting in line or standing for a long time.



9. Every few weeks, clean out your backpack for unused items that may be weighing you down.




10. Look for backpacks that stand upright when placed on the ground.


