

We've had such an exciting quarter in 3rd grade! Here's a look at what we've been learning across subjects:



Science

We started by learning about clouds—how to identify them, predict storms, and estimate how long they might last. Coming up, we'll dive into the world of **sound waves**, experimenting with how sound travels at different distances. Students will be creating secret codes, making paper cup phones, and even mimicking sound waves through fun activities.

Social Studies

We explored why people form communities, why they are important, and how each of us can be a good community member. Students also studied Arizona's **state symbols** and showcased their learning by creating beautifully illustrated picture books. Looking ahead, we'll continue learning about Arizona, including the 5 C's: Cattle, Cotton, Citrus, Climate, and Copper.





Math

Our focus has been on multiplication strategies such as skip counting, repeated addition, arrays, and number lines. Now we are applying these skills to explore **area** and seeing how it connects to real-life situations.

Students are creating Arizona-themed **cups and saucers**. Once they are glazed and finished, we'll celebrate with a classroom tea party using their handmade pottery. For the **County Fair**, 3rd grade will also be making **totem poles out of recycled materials**, each one representing the 5 C's of Arizona. This project combines art, culture, and sustainability in a creative way!

We are so proud of how hard our 3rd graders are working and can't wait to see their creativity shine in the upcoming projects!

8th Grade Marine Biology Club - By Ms. K. Ortiz

Nestled about 26 miles off the coast of Southern California, Catalina Island feels almost like another world. Each May, Elgin School's 8th Grade Marine Biology Club has the opportunity to attend a week-long educational camp on this beautiful island. Catalina Island Marine Institute (CIMI) provides students the chance to engage in confidence and team building activities, such as snorkeling, kayaking, rock-climbing, and tide-pooling, all while learning about the ocean and unique ecosystems of the island.



Catalina Island and the waters around it are home to numerous species of wildlife such as bison, fox, woodpeckers, blue whales, dolphins, sea lions, sunfish, and maybe the most notably, the Garibaldi, California's state marine fish, which is bright orange in color. While on the island, students are housed in ocean front cabins and provided delicious balanced meals by the camp's kitchen staff. All educational labs and activities are overseen by Camp Counselors and the 8th Grade sponsors.

Camp Counselors are typically collegiate level Marine Biology students seeking further education and research opportunities while employed at CIMI. Kailey was the Eagle's counselor in 2021-22 and shared her passion and knowledge of algae and kelp with Elgin students. Giant Kelp forests are found just off the coast of Catalina Island. Students snorkeled through, took samples, and even got to taste the kelp. Jules hosted the 2022-23 Elgin Eagles and shared her expertise of marine mammals. Jules has worked with dolphins, orcas, and other marine mammals in Aquarium (captivity) environments. During a kayaking trip students were able to observe a baby sea lion sunbathing on a rock while another adult sea lion swam nearby.

The 2025-26 8th Grade Marine Biology club will be hosting multiple fundraising opportunities including the Annual Walk-A-Thon, Krispy Kreme doughnut sales, and sports concessions to fund their CIMI trip in May 2026. It is the generous support of the community that has allowed the CIMI trip to occur for the past 17 years, with the exception of 2 years that the camp was closed due to COVID restrictions. Donations up to \$400 are eligible for Tax Credit.

Preventing Bug Bites

Summer is winding down, the humidity is up, and our rains still are few and far between. With this weather, bug season is upon us. We have been having students coming in complaining of bug bites, both on campus, as well as from home.

We wanted to share some information with you. Students have been coming in to the nurse's office, as well as their classrooms complaining of bugs biting them outside while on the playground and other outside areas. Some of the bugs seen are mosquitos, some type of very small black round beetle, and some type of outdoor bug appearing to be flea-like. They have all been from exposure outside. There is no concern for an indoor infestation, or bugs being brought in from homes or uncleanliness of any type. Elgin School has routine pest service and daily cleaning. All of the classrooms and other areas have been inspected and are clear of any contagious bugs. Unfortunately, there are bugs outside which is beyond the control of the school.

Here are some tips to help keep your children more comfortable and healthier during this bug season:

- Wear shoes, long socks, pants, and shirts, preferably light in color.
- If preferred, apply a bug deterrent of your choice to skin before attending school. Do not send these types of sprays or lotions to school with your child. They are considered medication and can possibly cause allergic reactions for other students.
- Talk with your child about refraining from rolling around in the grass, dirt, gravel, and wood chip substrates.
- Consider alternatives to playing on grassy fields. There are two large shaded areas on the playgrounds where you child can sit or stand in the shade and talk, read, or play games.
- Remove clothes and shower before bed every night. Launder clothing every day, if possible, to help prevent bugs from entering the home.
- If bitten, refrain from scratching the bites to help prevent secondary infections.
- Apply anti-irritation lotions or ointments, such as calamine lotion, Benadryl type creams, etc. for itching. Epsom salt warm baths or oatmeal baths can help relieve itching.
 Naturopathic oils can help with both being a bug repellant, as well as act as a skin irritation reliever.

- Canary melons are are named for their bright, canaryyellow skin which resembles the color of a canary bird.
- The flesh of the canary melon is pale ivory or light green and is known for its mildly sweet, tangy, and refreshing flavor, similar to cantaloupe.
- Canary melons are a good source of vitamins A and C, which are important for maintaining healthy skin and boosting the immune system. They also provide dietary fiber, which aids in digestion.
- With over 90% water content, canary melons are a fantastic way to stay hydrated, especially during the hot summer months.
- When selecting a canary melon, look for one that is vibrant in color and feels heavy. A ripe canary melon will have a slight give when gently pressed at the blossom end.
- To test the ripeness of a canary melon, give it a light tap. A ripe melon will produce a deep, hollow sound, indicating that it is juicy and ready to eat.


